BnE Conference

Bridge and Embrace, from the Asia Pacific region, jointly held the first Catholic conference on LGBT+ and faith at Ishvani Kendra Catholic institute in Pune, India.



The three-day event "Gender and Sexual Minorities in India: A Synodal Approach to Pastoral Care and Social Inclusion," brought together over 300 participants, including approximately 80 LGBT+ individuals, members from 70 religious congregations, and representatives from 40 dioceses; it featured diverse voices, including members of the Hijra and Kinner communities, parents from the Sweekar support group, and allies. Esteemed Church leaders extended their support through greetings and blessings.

These shared experiences fostered deeper understanding of the challenges faced by LGBT+ individuals within religious contexts, as well as dialogue between the Catholic Church and the LGBT+ community in India.



Suquaiya

The GNRC Iberoamerica community recently came together for their annual Suyaquiqui Advent gathering, held virtually. This cherished tradition celebrates the spirit of Advent through the lens of the region's rich cultural diversity and deep-rooted faith.

The chosen scripture, "As soon as the voice of your greeting reached my ears, the creature I carry in my body jumped for joy" (Luke 1:44), highlighted the spirit of connection and the profound sense of community that characterizes Suquaiya.

While the event was virtual, it remained deeply personal and meaningful, as participants shared stories and experiences that reflected their unique regional heritage. The gathering also served as a reminder of GNRC's commitment to fostering community and dialogue, even across geographical and cultural boundaries.



Jubilee Pilgrimage

Walking Together

As part of the Jubilee 2025 celebrations, many LGBT+ associations will gather in Rome for the pilgrimage "La tenda di Gionata and other associations". This event is a moment of reflection, unity, and spiritual renewal for participants from diverse backgrounds and communities of faith.

The pilgrimage will begin Saturday September 6, 2025 at 3:00 PM in Piazza Pia, where attendees will assemble before embarking on a symbolic journey together. Leading the procession will be the Jubilee Cross, emblem of mercy and liberation, as participants make their way to the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica. Walking through this sacred portal serves as a profound act of faith, renewal, and commitment to inclusion and love within the Christian community.

This pilgrimage is accompanied by the initiative "Chiesa Casa per Tutti" (Church, a Home for All), which includes two additional key events:

- Prayer Vigil: On Friday, September 5, 2025, at 8:00 PM, a prayer vigil will be held at the historic Church of the Gesù in Piazza del Gesù, Rome. This gathering will offer an opportunity for spiritual preparation and reflection, bringing together participants in a moment of shared prayer and hope.
- -Eucharistic Celebration: On Saturday, September 6, 2025, at 11:00 AM, a celebratory mass will take place at the Church of the Gesù, emphasizing the themes of inclusion, reconciliation, and shared faith within the global Christian community.

Together, these events reflect a commitment to creating spaces of belonging and dialogue within the Church. They offer a chance to celebrate faith while advocating for a more inclusive spiritual community.

Madrid 5th Assembly

Walking Together: Rainbow Challenges after the Synod

The fifth Assembly of GNRC will take place in Madrid from August 21 to 25, 2025, focusing on the aftermath of the global Synodal Process. GNRC and its members contributed to the Synod, sharing insights and perspectives on inclusion and dialogue within faith communities. The Assembly will provide a platform to reflect on these contributions and consider the challenges that remain.

The program will include presentations on GNRC's Intergenerational Accompaniment Project, which addresses the needs of different age groups within the LGBT+ faith community. The project encourages dialogue between generations and explores how shared experiences can strengthen relationships and create a sense of belonging.

Updates on the Erasmus Plus project will also be presented. This initiative has focused on developing resources and tools to support LGBT+ individuals with sensory disabilities and promote accessibility and inclusion across Europe.

This Assembly will also mark the transition of the current Board. An opportunity to celebrate Chris Vella and Ruby Almeida who together have accumulated twenty years of collective service to GNRC.

The gathering will acknowledge their contributions and the impact of their work within the organization. The Assembly will bring members together for discussions, workshops, and opportunities to collaborate, providing space to build on shared efforts and prepare for future work.

John's secret

John had always been a faithful Catholic. Growing up in a tight-knit black community, the Church had been a cornerstone of his family's life. John's parents had instilled in him the values of compassion, forgiveness, and love, and he had always felt a deep connection to his faith.

But John had a secret. He had known he was gay since he was 14, and he had struggled to reconcile his faith with his identity. He had prayed for God to "fix" him, to make him straight, but as he grew older, he began to realize that he couldn't change who he was.
